## Day one – Thursday 1 May 2025

### Personal leadership journey

Shifting to more senior and strategic roles is often the logical next step in a career path or it can be an opportunity grasped that was unplanned and unexpected. Whatever the journey, it's illuminating to explore how we have arrived where we are and the values and principles that have underpinned many of our decisions and actions in our career. This session will explore just that.

#### What you'll get out of the session

You'll explore what drives you and the values that determine your decisions and actions. This will help inform professional development plans and deepen understanding of what is important in your career progression.

### Working with the media

In this interactive and skills-based session, you'll have an opportunity to discuss experiences of and any views you may have on dealing with the media. You'll acquire skills and strategies which can help decide how and when to engage with journalists. This will involve small work groups to prepare for and then take part in a realistic media interview.

You'll develop understanding, confidence and practical skills in working with the media, learning in a safe space how to respond when the media gaze is focused on those in Director roles and how to respond professionally and ably.

## Day two – Friday 2 May 2025

### Brave and authentic leadership

Tackling the many challenges that those in senior strategic roles face whilst staying true to our values and maintaining our own health and wellbeing requires a style of leadership that is both brave and authentic. Drawing on the work of Brené Brown, this session will explore what that looks like, how we 'turn up' at work and support ourselves to be the leaders we want to be and nurture cultures that encourage bravery, compassion and authenticity.

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#### What you'll get out of the session 🏆

This workshop will provide opportunity for participants to consider their own leadership style and experiences of being brave. It will provide some practical ways of strengthening their own ability to be authentic brave leaders and to promote that culture in their workplace.

### Leading collaborative, strengths based change

Moving to, or embedding, cultures that build on strengths, promoting independence and wellbeing and put the person at the heart of their support and harness the power of communities and partners, is an ambition and a challenge faced by all leaders in adult social care. This session will explore some of the theory of leading change, the experience and evidence for what works in moving to collaborative community led models and the skills required of today's leaders in driving such change.

## Numbers to knowledge

Leaders understand the critical role that data plays in decision-making, informing strategy, allocating resources and effective governance, and yet a high proportion of those who are asked to make these decisions report a lack of confidence when it comes to using data as part of the process. This session will explore how data leadership is not about big data analysis or complex mathematics, it's about knowing the potential pitfalls and the common issues that hide in even the simplest of data sets and having the confidence and techniques to uncover the truth.

## Human rights based leadership

Wednesday 4 June 2025

Positioning human rights at the heart of our leadership is a powerful, challenging but fundamentally essential decision for a strategic leader. As such, knowledge, understanding, and an ability to apply human rights to our work are vital and this session will provide an overview and focus on the most relevant aspects pertinent to the role of senior leaders and directors in adult social care.

## Managing the narrative and media communications

As senior leaders there is a need to try and manage the messages that get shared publicly in the current media. This session will explore how to proactively aim to do that, using examples of stories that have gone well and those that haven't and how, what, as leaders you can do to try to influence the stories and the narrative that gets shared publicly in relation to your organisation.

### What you'll get out of the workshop

Participants will refresh and deepen their understanding of how the media works, the learning from history and the tips to avoid being their organisation being subject to negative and avoidable media interest for the wrong reasons. It will provide top tips on how to manage a local narrative, to connect with key people and to promote the messages they want shared.

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
